2024 CCCHP Grant Application - Part 2: Narrative Description

Part A- Questions

1. Project Description

What buildings, prehistoric feature, historic feature, or culturally significant feature are you restoring/rehabilitating?

This project entails the exterior maintenance of three historic wooden structures located at North Central Nevada Historical Society's Humboldt Museum in Winnemucca, Nevada. Specifically, these structures are known as the 1907 St. Mary's Episcopal Church, the 1880s Greinstein Building, and the 1907 Cumley-Richardson House.

What is the historic significance of the property?

The former St. Mary's Episcopal Church, built in 1907 and originally located on Lay Street, was gifted to North Central Nevada Historical Society in 1976. With the help of a bicentennial grant, the former church was moved to a piece of land donated by the City of Winnemucca for the purposes of developing a local history museum. On May 13, 1977, Humboldt Museum officially opened inside the church-turned-museum.

The Greinstein Building was constructed sometime during in the 1880s, and was occupied by the Greinsteins' Nevada Hide & Junk Store by 1911. It was originally located on Sonoma Street, where it once had access to a Western Pacific Railroad spur, before the Greinstein Family donated it to NCNHS in 1982. As a part of Humboldt Museum, the Greinstein Building housed a thrift shop from 1984-2012, which helped support museum operations. Today, the Greinstein Building is used as display space and currently exhibits a rustic cow camp-style kitchen, a barber/doctors room, and a store area.

The Cumley-Richardson House, an Eastlake style home, was built in 1899 on Railroad Street. The house was originally occupied by families involved in the railroad and mining industries. It was donated by Nora Chipman-Saunders, a descended of the Richardson Family, and was moved to the Humboldt Museum complex in 2005. With the help of CCA grants, the Cumley-Richardson House was restored and opened to the public for tours in 2012. The Cumley-Richardson House is listed as number 080148 on the Nevada Historic Registry.

How do you propose to restore/rehabilitate it?

Routine exterior maintenance is necessary for each of the three above mentioned historic wooden structures at Humboldt Museum and will include cleaning, prepping and repainting exteriors on all three buildings, repair of loose and missing cedar roof shingles on the former St. Mary's Episcopal Church Building, application of an oil preservation treatment to all three buildings' cedar shingle roofs, and where necessary, reglazing of windows.

Cleaning, prepping and repainting the exteriors of all three buildings will entail a light spray washing, light hand scraping, hand sanding, and painting with two coats of exterior paint to match the existing color. Additionally, the doors of the former St. Mary's Episcopal Church will be lightly sanded and resealed to match the existing color/stain, while the trim of the Cumley-Richardson house will be repainted with the same existing dark-red color currently found.

Each building also needs an oil preservative treatment applied to the existing cedar shingles in order to help prevent dry-rot and shingle loss. Application of wood treatment oil will not alter existing roof colors and will be applied with the use of a rented manlift.

The former St. Mary's Episcopal Church needs replacement and repair of some missing and damaged cedar shingles, including an area along the peak cap. The roof is not leaking at this time, but without attention, leaking and water damage will eventually occur. Repair of the roof shingles will be done with the use of a rented manlift.

As needed, windows on all three buildings will be reglazed.

Lastly, during the course of work, should any fascia or decorative trim be found in need of repairs, every attempt to repair existing wooden details will be made before replacement with new material is considered.

Who will be doing the work?

What is the timeline for the project?

The proposed start date of this project will be spring 2025, once temperatures are consistently above freezing overnight. When work begins, it is estimated to take two weeks to complete.

Who holds title to the property?

North Central Nevada Historical Society owns title to the property, including all structures and the parcel on which they sit.

2. Building Use/Community Involvement

How and by whom will the facility be used?

Each of the three wooden buildings proposed to benefit from this grant are considered part of Humboldt Museum, a local history museum focused on preserving and increasing the accessibility of north central Nevada's history.

Each year, Humboldt Museum sees approximately 5,000 visitors. On average, approximately 35% of visitors are locals and 65% are travelers. Humboldt Museum saw visitors from all 50 states and 23 separate countries during 2023.

In addition to the traveling public, local Winnemucca and Humboldt County residents also enjoy visiting the museum with frequency. Each year the museum hosts multiple school tours (for both home school and public school children of all grades), art shows, guest speakers, and special events such as participation in the annual Basque Festival, Haunted Winnemucca, and even gold panning demonstrations to name a few. In addition to housing events and temporary shows, the wooden buildings at Humboldt

Museum help tell the story of the community with semi-permanent displays helping to illustrate what life was like in this region decades ago.

Who will be responsible for management of the building and its programs/activities?

North Central Nevada Historical Society's 11-member Board of Directors and the Executive Director, Dana Toth, are responsible for management of the buildings and all programs.

How has the community been involved in your project? How will the community continue to be involved in your project?

In the early 1970s, the local newspaper started drumming up support for the formation of a historical society in Winnemucca, NV. Their efforts were successful in uniting preservation-minded locals and in 1974, North Central Nevada Historical Society officially became incorporated. The local community and newly formed historical society played a huge part in fundraising for a museum and in 1977 they saw their work come to fruition with the opening of Humboldt Museum. Land for the new museum was donated to the historical society by the City of Winnemucca and a building to house the museum itself, a repurposed church, was donated by the Episcopal Church.

Since 2001, North Central Nevada Historical Society's Humboldt Museum has been primarily supported by Humboldt County tax revenues, specifically via NRS 244.377, and receives a rate of 1.5 cents per \$100.00 in county property tax revenue.

In addition to spearheading the formation of the museum itself and supporting the museum through taxes and donations, the local community takes pride in the museum as the repository where their history is kept for future generations. The community helps bring attention to the museum with many crossorganization events, family visits, and through offering suggestions for programming. Locally, folks seem to also recognize the importance of keeping a clean, respectable museum appearance as they have started organizing community clean up days on and around the museum complex. Local citizens also showed strong support of their museum in 2022, when they successfully advocated for the City of Winnemucca to donate and additional 5.74 acres of land for a future museum expansion.

How will the community continue to be involved in the use of the buildings?

During regular business hours all buildings at Humboldt Museum are open for tours. In addition to being available for tours, many community events are held at the Humboldt Museum complex each year such as art shows, guest speakers, various public meetings, fundraisers, and informational presentations such as gold panning demonstrations. Occasionally, the museum may be rented for private functions too, such as weddings. Humboldt Museum also relies upon the local community for ongoing donations that may be used to help interpret and document local history.

How are your restoration/rehabilitation plans related to the uses of the buildings?

With proper maintenance, the wooden historic structures at Humboldt Museum will remain aesthetically inviting, clean, and safe for many years to come. The north central Nevada environment can be very harsh on wood, so staying on top of treatments is crucial and highly recommended.

What importance to tourism (cultural or otherwise) will the facility have?

Humboldt Museum is a true community anchor where locals are proud to store and share their history and identity of the region. Whether they're passing through or new to the community, visitors find that North Central Nevada Historical Society's Humboldt Museum is a welcoming place to learn more about many aspects of the region. The parking area, which is conducive for RVs and is located next to a picnic area overlooking the Humboldt River Valley, is also enjoyed by traveling tourists and locals alike.

Currently, Humboldt Museum has a 4.7 rating on Google, a 5/5 rating on Facebook, and a 4.5 rating on TripAdvisor.

3. Project Support/Financial

What specific contributions (cash, land, labor, materials, etc.) have been provided toward the project form the community and/or other sources?

Humboldt Museum activities, programming, ongoing maintenance and general operation are supported through private donations, gift shop sales, membership dues, grants, and support from Humboldt County and the City of Winnemucca. Currently, Humboldt County provides nearly 80% of the annual budget through NRS 244.377, giving 1.5 cents per \$100 generated in county property tax revenue.

What grants and additional funding (last three years), including amounts, has the organization received or will receive for this project?

Standard sources of revenue mentioned above, such as support from Humboldt County and private donations, will be used to complete ongoing projects that maintain the integrity of the museum property and operation. CCCHP funds will enable the museum to more easily complete ongoing required maintenance of the facility's historic wooden structures.

How will the facility sustain itself financially in the future?

NCNHS/Humboldt Museum will continue to receive its main source of funding from Humboldt County. To subsidize, Humboldt Museum will continue to raise money through donations, gift shop sales, memberships and grants.

Please provide evidence that you can implement the project and maintain a viable program in the future. Humboldt Museum has maintained a viable program of operation since May 1977. Over the last 47 years, it has a proven record of successfully meeting and overcoming varied obstacles, implementing new approaches and becoming a strong community anchor with well-recognized local support. There are no reasons to expect this situation to change. Maintenance of the historic structures at Humboldt Museum will ensure the museum continues to thrive well into the future and is a necessary part of ensuring a viable program.

North Central Nevada Historical Society's Humboldt Museum opened 47 years ago, in May 1977. It was created to collect, preserve and interpret the history and prehistory of north central Nevada for future generations. Today, all aspects of local history, from fossils to pocket watches for example, are found within the museum's collections and are used to help illustrate the past through research, exhibit and interpretation. Undoubtedly, Humboldt Museum will continue to exhibit and interpret local history and host community events well into the foreseeable future. The museum's growing collections and programming are very impressive and have recently warranted the City of Winnemucca to donate another 5.74 acres of land for future expansion of the museum, thus further exemplifying the community's support of Humboldt Museum as a community anchor.

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



5. Articles of Incorporation, Mission Statement, length of time established, and history – Attached are North Central Nevada Historical Society's Articles of Incorporation, Mission Statement. Below is a statement about NCNHS's time established and organization history.

NCNHS's Time Established and Organization History

North Central Nevada Historical Society (NCNHS) was formed in 1974 and is the parent entity of Humboldt Museum. In 1976, the City of Winnemucca donated a piece of land overlooking the Humboldt River and the California Trail to NCNHS for the purpose of becoming a museum site. With the help of a bicentennial grant, the Historical Society was able to move the former St. Mary's Episcopal Church to this property. The former church officially opened as Humboldt Museum in May 1977, approximately 47 years ago.

In 1982, the Greinstein Family donated and 1880s store to Humboldt Museum. The former store building housed the museum's thrift shop form 1984 until 2012. It is now used as display space.

In 1985, the first-story of the modern brick museum building was finished. The modern brick building provided a space for storing the museum's collections as well as additional display space, office and restrooms. In 2001, a second-story was added to this building. This upper level is now the main entry point for the Humboldt Museum and contains the gift shop, an audio/visual room, a library, an office, restrooms and several displays.

In 2005, the Cumley-Richardson House was moved to the museum property. With the help of CCA grants, the house-turned-museum was restored and has been open for tours since December 2012.

In 2015, NCNHS worked with the City of Winnemucca to pave Museum Lane, move overhead utilities underground and pave a parking area for the museum.

In 2017, with support from the Bureau of Land Management and the Southern Nevada Conservancy, the Humboldt River Viewing Plaza was constructed. This covered plaza overlooks the Humboldt River, has interpretive panels, seating and a time capsule. It is also complemented by adjacent metal artwork.

In 2022, the citizens of Winnemucca successfully advocated for the City of Winnemucca to donate and additional 5.74 acres of land for future museum expansion. Currently, the executive director is working with Cushing Terrell and Associates to develop a master plan for expansion plans.

North Central Nevada Historical Society is a membership based organization with an 11-member board of directors. Ten of the members are chosen from the general membership and one is an appointed Humboldt County Commissioner. The board of directors elect officers of the board among themselves and oversee the executive director. The executive director reports to the board of directors and oversees all operation of Humboldt Museum as well as all other employees and volunteers.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF

THE NORTH CENTRAL NEVADA HISTORICAL SOCIETY As amended May 1975

The undersigned, being all the officer and trustees of the North Central Nevada Historical Society do hereby certify that the Articles of Incorporation thereof hare heretofore been amended, as follows and the Amended Articles of Incorporation of the North Central Nevada Historical Society, a non-profit corporation under NRS 81.350 as heretofore adopted are as follows:

ARTICLE I

Name. That the name of the Corporation shall be known in law as THE NORTH CENTRAL NEVADA HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

<u>ARTICLE II</u>

<u>Purpose</u>. That this Corporation shall forever be a non-profit Corporation organized solely for the advancement of civic activities within the State of Nevada and particularly in the County of Humboldt and neighboring areas.

The objective of this corporation shall be to bring together those people interested in history and especially in the history of Humboldt County both as it is presently constituted and as it originally existed.

The Corporation's major function will be to discover and collect any material which may help to establish or illustrate the history of the area: its exploration, settlement, development, and activities in peace and in war; its progress in population, wealth, education, arts, science, agriculture, manufactures, mining trade and transportation. It will collect printed material such as histories, genealogies, biographies, descriptions, gazetteers, directories,

newspapers, programs, catalogs, circulars, handbills, and posters; manuscript material such as letters, diaries, journals, memoranda, reminiscences, rosters, service records, account books, oral histories, charts, maps, surveys, and field books; and museum material such as pictures, photographs, paintings, portraits, scenes, aboriginal relics, and material objects illustrative of life, conditions events, and activities of the past and the present.

The society will provide for the preservation of such material and for its accessibility, as far as may be feasible, to all who wish to examine or study it, to co-operate with officials in insuring the preservation and accessibility of the records and archives of the County and of its cities, towns, villages, and institutions, and to undertake the preservation of historic buildings, monuments, and markers.

The society will disseminate historical information and arouse interest in the past by publishing historical material in the newspapers or otherwise; by sponsoring education programs, addresses, lectures, papers, and discussions; by marking historic building sites, and trails; and by using the media of radio and newspapers to awaken public interest.

ARTICLE III

<u>Location</u>. That the principal office of this Corporation for the transaction of the business of the Corporation shall be located in Humboldt County, State of Nevada.

ARTICLE IV

Board of Trustees. That the Board of Trustees shall be not less than five (5) in number and may or may not consist of the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. The term of office of each member

shall not exceed six (6) years. The first Board of Trustees named herein shall by its by-laws provide for the future number of Trustees and their terms, for the manner in which the Board of Trustees shall be chosen and removed, but each shall be a citizen of the United States and a resident of the State of Nevada.

ARTICLE V

Membership, elections. That the Board of Trustees shall by its by-laws prescribed the terms and qualifications for membership in the Corporation. It shall in addition provide for an annual meeting of the Corporation at which the officers shall be elected. The term of office for each officer shall be one (1) year or until a successor has been chosen.

ARTICLE VI

<u>First Board</u>. That the names and residence of the first Board of Trustees who shall serve until their successors are elected are as follows:

ARTICLE VII

No Inurement. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of, or be distributable to, its member, trustees, officer, or other private person, except that the corporation shall be authorized an empowered to pay reasonable compensation

of services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the purposes set forth in Article II hereof. No substantial part of the activities of the Corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the Corporation shall not participate in, or intervene in (including the publishing or distribution of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. Notwithstanding any other provision of these Articles, this Corporation shall not, except to an insubstantial degree, engage in any activities or exercise any powers that are not in furtherance of the purposes of this Corporation (Added by Amendment, April 29, 1975)

ARTICLE VIII

Dissolution. Upon the dissolution of the Corporation, the Board of Trustees shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Corporation, dispose of all of the assets of the Corporation exclusively for the purposes of the Corporation in such manner, or to such organization or organizations organized and operated exclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (or the corresponding provision of any future United State Internal Revenue Law), as the Board of Trustees shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by the Court of Common Pleas of the county in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization of organizations, as said Court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes. (Added by Amendment, April 29, 1975)



Background-history of the society/museum

Humboldt Museum's parent organization, North Central Nevada Historical Society (NCNHS), was incorporated in 1974 as a 501(c)3 non-profit organization. There were two goals at this time. The first was to publish *Humboldt County, 1905*, a collection of letters surveying the region that were written by newspaper's editor, Allan Bragg, and published in the 1905 editions of *The Silver State*. The second major goal was to establish a museum to serve as the region's repository for historical artifacts and data.

In September 1976, with the help of a bi-centennial grant, the 1907 St. Mary's Episcopal Church was relocated to a 2.96 acre parcel of land that was later donated to the North Central Nevada Historical Society by the City of Winnemucca. The former church opened in May of 1977, at its new location, as Humboldt Museum.

In 1978 Humboldt County and the City of Winnemucca purchased a \$75,000 private local collection of artifacts, including several antique automobiles. The

bulk of the collection was housed in a leased storage facility, wherein most items suffered damage from flood waters more than once. Momentum for the museum's future was foreseeable, and the need to construct a new, larger facility to house and display the growing collections was recognized. Extensive efforts in soliciting funds from local businesses, individuals, foundations, and local governments proved successful when the doors opened to Phase I of the new building in May of 1985.

In June 1999, Humboldt County approved Resolution #6-7-99 allowing for a 1.5 cent ad valorem tax rate, on each \$100 of assessed valuation in the county, in order to fund the museum. The resolution also ended all county oversight of museum employees.

By 1999, efforts to expand the new museum structure, and complete Phase II, were well underway. Despite several generous contributions from multiple resources, and a \$400,000 USDA loan, the Phase II expansion had to be reduced to half its intended square footage. By May 2001 Phase II was completed. The opening of Phase II coincided with the unveiling of the large, impressive, Black Rock Mammoth Exhibit.

In 1983, the Greinstein Family donated an 1880's building, once called "Nevada Hide & Junk", to NCNHS. With the help of many volunteers, the structure was moved onto NCNH's property, semi-restored, and operated as "Humboldt Museum Thrift Shop" until 2012 when it was converted to exhibit space.

In 2005 Nora Chipman donated the Richardson-Saunders House to North Central Nevada Historical Society. The 1899 Eastlake Style home was relocated from 418 Railroad Street to its current location in December 2005. Grants were obtained from the State Historic Preservation Office -Commission of Cultural Affairs, in order to complete the period renovations. The historic home was opened for tours December 2012.

During the summer of 2013, Humboldt Museum saw another big change. An impressive 30' x 90' plaza was constructed in front of the main museum structure in hopes of stabilizing the building which had some issues with unstable footings leading to cracks in the brick support walls. The plaza has also doubled as a wonderful venue for outdoor events.

The City of Winnemucca paved Museum Lane in fall 2015. This improvement also added curbs and gutters, aiding the drainage in the area. In conjunction with this project, it was decided to relocate all overhead power and telephone lines underground and to pave the upper parking lot. These improvements drastically cleaned up the appearance of Humboldt Museum. It was at this time the museum's main entry was moved from the lower area to the newly paved upper parking lot and doors fronting Museum Way.

In 2017, a viewing plaza overlooking the Humboldt River Valley was built alongside the upper parking lot. In addition to the large overhead metal shade covering, the viewing plaza also features a bench, two picnic tables and six panels interpreting the history and usage of the Humboldt River Valley. Metal artwork complementing the information on the interpretive panels was also commissioned for the back wall of the museum.

In 2018, Humboldt Museum obtained a Main Street grant from the Governor's Office of Economic Development for the publication of *Winnemucca Historical Tour of Downtown*, a book featuring 73 properties. This project was an effort to renew interest in preserving and interpreting the history of the built environment in downtown Winnemucca. During this time, Humboldt Museum also helped the City of Winnemucca become a Certified Local Government with the National Park Service, which resulted in the creation of the Winnemucca Historic Resources Commission (HRC). Humboldt Museum's executive director was seated as the chairperson of the HRC.

In 2020 and 2021, Humboldt Museum installed a new and popular Basque Exhibit in phases. This project incorporated an interactive digital element as part of the exhibit. A first for Humboldt Museum.

During 2022, after strong community support, Winnemucca City Council decided with stipulations to gift 5.74 acres of land to North Central Nevada Historical Society for the purposes of expanding the museum. This expansion must be completed, with a certificate of occupancy by July 2032.

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Currently, Humboldt Museum has three staff members: the executive director, administrative assistant, and a part-time gift shop operator/greeter.

Full time staff include Dana Toth who was appointed as Executive Director in October 2011, and Lindsey Myers who was hired as Administrative Assistant in August 2022.

Volunteers also help with special events and cleaning, while the more experienced volunteers assist with collections management, repairs and related matters.
